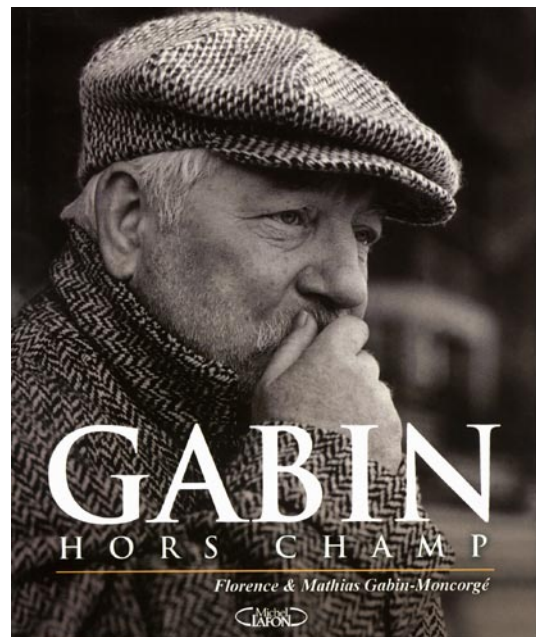

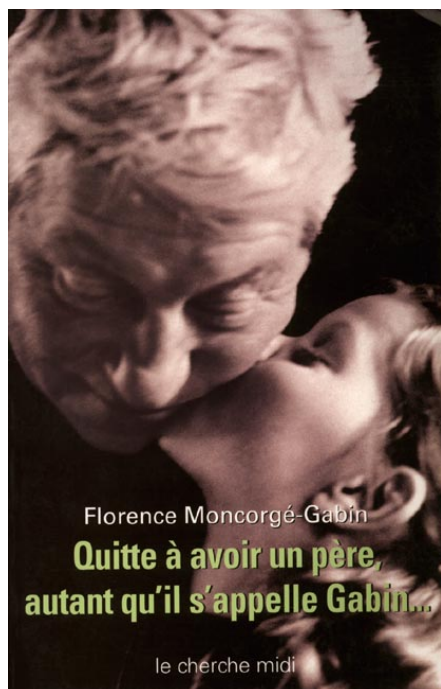
New Books



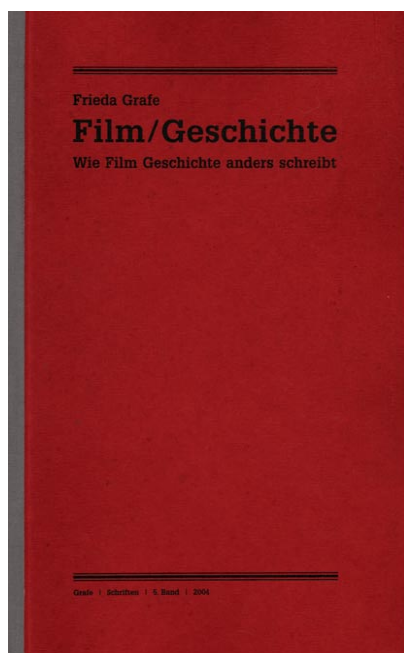
Florence & Mathias Gabin-Moncorgé: *Gabin. Hors Champ*
Éditions Michel Lafon, Paris 2004, 192 pp.

This is a beautiful coffee table book edited by Jean Gabins children Mathias and Florence. There isn't much on the Dietrich-Gabin affair but a few photos of which three look like they have been taken out of the home movies. For those who admire Gabin and can not get

enough there is a book by his daughter which is not a biography of her father but just adds some personal touches. In fact it tells the story of the daughter being a scriptgirl, director and second unit director in modern French cinema.

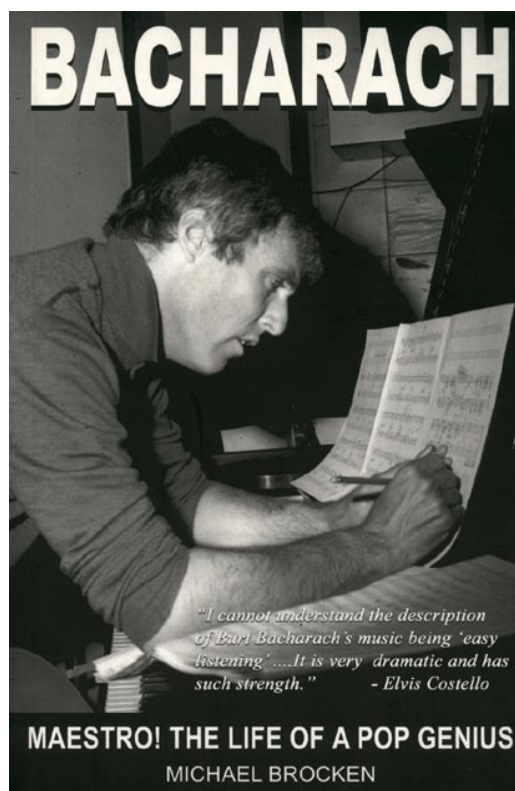

Frieda Grafe: Film/Geschichte. Wie Film Geschichte anders schreibt
Grafe Schriften 5. Band, hrsg. Von Enno Patalas, Verlag Brinkmann & Bose, Berlin 2004, 222 pp.

This is the sixth volume of Frieda Grafes writings on film. Among others it contains an essay on Leni Riefenstahl, on Hollywood Fashion and the often quoted essay: "Das Bild Marlene und wie daraus ihr Image wurde" (Marlene and how she became an image). As with the five foregoing volumes this one also sets a standard in serious writing on film.



Michael Brocken: Bacharach. Maestro! The Life of a Pop Genius

Chrome Dreams Publication, Michael Brocken, UK 2003, 319 pp.

Burt Bacharach is one of the pop music all time greats; a book on Bacharach could be done with photos showing the man with celebrities, with a lot of talk-talk and bla-bla, making a lot of noise but no sound (and sense) at all. This one is different; it is a serious study of his life and his music. Just by reading a few pages you realize that Michael Brocken over the years not only done a lot of research work; he is also able to organize the results of his research in a very readable and sometimes entertaining way. Great work.

An Ufa "Blue Angel" still with Marlene on the ton (censored) fetched € 518 (Bassenge Berlin, Auction 84)

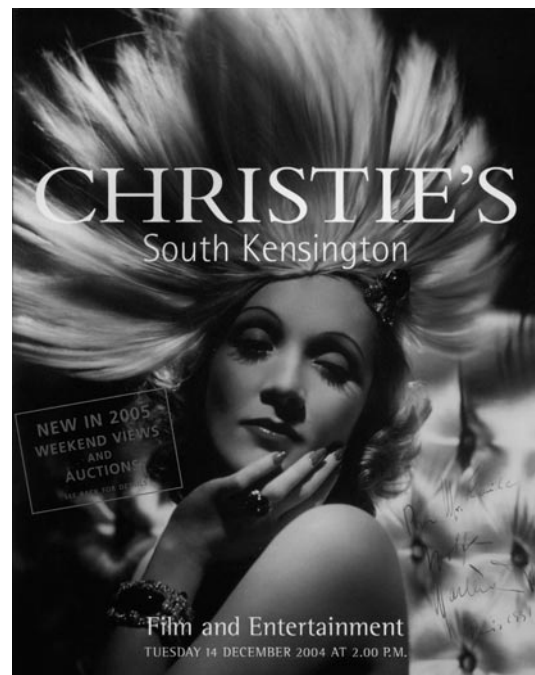
The Rene Hubert sketch of Marlene in "The Flame of New Orleans" made it to \$1.300 at profiles in history.
