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

New Books



Siegfried Kracauer Werke: Kleine Schriften zum Film, vol. I 1921-1927, vol. II 1928 – 1931, vol. III 1932-1961, paperback edition Suhkamp Verlag, Frankfurt am Main, 2004, 430 pp. (I), 576 pp. (II), 666 pp. (III)

In his exile years Siegfried Kracauer, the german film critic, sociologist and poet, wrote "From Caligari to Hitler" – a history of the german film in the twenties which influenced generations of film historians. Inka Mülder-Bach now edited the film reviews which Kracauer did for his daily living. They were published in german, french and italian newspapers and journals. Volume two and and three include writings on half a dozen Marlene films. Although most of his reviews are not in favour of any of those films with its intellectual wit and style in quality and substance he easily surpasses any other author. A great book for film historians and lovers of german culture.



Erica Carter: Dietrich's Ghosts. The Sublime and the Beautiful in Third Reich Film
British Film Institute, London 2004, 246 pp.

Here's another "must have" book - even if you don't speak english or if you don't know what the lady is talking about. "Dietrichs Ghosts" has the most beautiful cover you can imagine. Erica Carter studies the german Nazi cinema from an aesthetic point of view. She uses Immanuel Kants terms of the beautiful, the sublime and the entertaining to define Dietrichs reception by audiences inside the Third Reich. And she goes on by analysing the swedish star Zarah Leander as a substitute for Gerta Garbo and Marlene alike. Does this sound a bit complicated, even intellectual? Yes, it is; we wished the book would be published in german. Then we wouldn't have to read all the german quotes in english. But it has such a great title and such a wonderful cover that you'll never regret the money you invested.



<u>Cristina Peri Rossi: Die Zigarette. Leben mit einer verführerischen Geliebten</u>
Berenberg, Berlin 2004, 166 pp.

Are you a smoker? Or are you a non-smoking smoker? Then this is the book for you. It's not an academic study on the history of smoking, it's not sponsored by the tobacco industry. No, it is a real poetic study on the culture of smoking. It tells you exactly what smoking means to you, why you smoke and why you continue to do so (also why you shouldn't and why you will miss it once you've stopped). In the end it concludes with a sympathetic chapter on the art of loosing a habit and how to live with the loss of your beloved cigarette. The book also provides an insight look on the life of the Cigarreras -the female workers who made cigarettes in the factory - just like Concha Perez in the "Devil is a woman".
